Measuring systems

A measuring system is a legally recognised method for measuring solids and liquids.





UK measuring systems

There are two systems still in use in the UK today.

 Metric – A universal measure around the world.

 Imperial – An old measure created in the UK and still used in the drinks industry.





The different names in measures

Metric

- Weight: Kilograms (kg) and grams (g)
- Liquid: Litres (L) and millilitres
 (ml)





The different names in measures

Imperial

- Weight: Pounds (Ib) and ounces
 (oz)
- Liquid: Pints (pts) and fluid ounces (floz)





Law enforcement

In the UK each local council will have its own 'weights and measures' authority.

It is part of trading standards.





Law enforcement

Local weights and measures
authorities form part of the trading
standards departments that deliver
the local enforcement of weights
and measures legislation.





Benefits of metric

Metric system is a decimal system of weights and measures it is easy to convert between units, e.g. from millimetres to metres, or grams to kilograms.





The law

Britain follows a metric system.

Legally all food and drink should display metric weights.





Who uses legal measures?

The regulation of weights and measures is necessary for science, industry, and commerce.

It is very important in the food and drink industry.





Exceptions to the law

The only products you can sell in imperial measures are:

•Draught beer, lager or cider by pint

•Milk in returnable containers by pint





Other legal measures

Other measures you may use:

Temperature – Celsius is metric

Luminosity – for light bulbs

Pressure – Beer kegs, drinks

dispensers
